
# August Newsletter 2020

#### Landscape Maintenance

A special thank you this month to Dottie Hawthorne and Jill Hotchkiss for all the work they did to bring the new Gaslight Bed to fruition. They spent many hours working on the design with Jason Bock from Drost Landscape and Jon Hummel from the City of Petoskey. Jon says he has already gotten many compliments and is happy to give the garden club the credit.

Nearby, the Soblesky gazebo is showing its age. The cedar roof shingles are in need of some repair. The gazebo was built in 2001 by the garden club at a cost of 25,000 as a memorial to Virginia and Ed Soblesky for their extremely generous donation to the garden club. Those funds comprise most of the endowment the garden club has at the Petoskey-Harbor Springs Area Community Foundation and the income comprises

most of our yearly budget. The area around the gazebo looked so unkept this year that we couldn't put our flower pots there. Six of them were relocated to the History Museum. Although the city has been short handed this summer, they have tried to maintain the area as best they could. In the next few weeks, Jon and his crew hope to rip out the rest of the shrubs and perennials and plant grass in those

sections. In conjunction with the city, we hope to come up with a plan to beautify the area and give it a new purpose.

In 2006, the garden club spent \$30,785 at the Waterfall Area to make improvements around the waterfall. In 2013, we spent \$3000 to redo the bed near the waterfall and add edging. Since then, we have spent close to \$10,000 to make improvements beside the old staircase, large boulders etc. Now that the new staircase has been installed, some of the work we did has been undone and we need to revisit that area. Carol Sutton is already working on getting ideas for what we can do there.

In 2010, we put some permanent plantings in what is now called the South Entrance Bed at a cost of \$2600. Before that we planted the whole bed with annuals in the spring and bulbs in the fall so those plantings have paid for themselves many times over in both cost and maintenance. However, after 10 years some of the shrubs have died or are dying and need to be replaced. We are working on that too!

While it is always fun to plan new projects, maybe next year we should think about making the necessary improvements to the gardens we already have. Maintenance will always be an issue. If we build it, we have to take care of it or make sure there are funds available for that purpose. Thank you everyone for taking such wonderful care of our gardens and containers this year. It has been one of our best at a challenging time.
