

NO MOW MAY

Help Our Local Pollinators Thrive

Will you be the 1st on your street/road to start this year off by waiting until after Memorial day to mow? Here is why that is a good idea.

May is the time when many so-called lawn weeds, like dandelions and clover plants, are in full bloom. These plants provide nectar for bees and other pollinators, when most other plants are not as quick to bloom. Since so many residents have been removing them for years, pollinators have had an extremely limited source of nutrition and resources to pollinate other plants in the spring. Bees, moths, hummingbirds, wasps, beetles, bats, and butterflies are all pollinators. Pollinators are absolutely essential for the reproduction of many plants in our environment. They are the reason why we have biodiversity and so many thriving gardens.

Also, this takes time and one No Mow May will single-handedly create a bumblebee population boom, but real change occurs when it is repeated year after year. Let's start in 2024 and reap the rewards going forward.

Protects from Insects

Insect invasions can be a real nuisance, especially during the warmer months. But did you know that aluminum foil can act as a deterrent? That's right, insects such as slugs and aphids are repelled by the reflective properties of foil. This makes it a great tool for protecting your plants.

Just place strips of aluminum foil around the base of your plants. The reflection will confuse and deter the pests, keeping your plants safe. This is a non-toxic and eco-friendly method that won't harm your plants or the environment. It's a win-win for your garden and Mother Earth.

For instance, you can use strips of foil to scare away birds from your fruit trees. The reflective properties of the foil will deter the birds and protect your fruits. Additionally, you can use foil to line the bottom of a plant pot. This will not only deter pests, but also reflect light back onto the plant, promoting growth.

Member Highlight - Sandy Selden

Sandy Selden joined the Petoskey Area Garden Club in 2006, not knowing how involved she would become! Sandy and her husband, Steve, have three daughters and have lived in Petoskey for 47 years.

Sandy's background is in art, and she has spent many years teaching painting and drawing at Crooked Tree Arts Center, and at Bay View Association. That creativity transfers to the garden. She said, "I love interesting colors and combinations. And I love that every year, gardening is a new beginning."

Sandy was asked to serve on the PAGC Board in 2006 as Youth Activities Chair. After a few years she became Program planner, Gaslight Garden Bed Captain, then served two years as President of PAGC. Her favorite job though, is the one she has now, Chair of PAGC's Children's Garden to be developed in 2026.

In 2017 the PAGC Board decided to create a children's garden, and a committee of seventeen members met to imagine what this new garden could be. "We had lots of ideas," Sandy says, "and we are lucky to have immediate support from the city, as well as professional advice from Deborah Kinney, designer of MSU's Children's Garden." That was the beginning.

PAGC's Children's Garden Committee established this mission for the project: "To nurture children in an engaging garden space dedicated to our regional plants. Our dream is to train our next generation to be good stewards of the earth."

Our goals for the new garden include:

- 1) Promote gardening and the knowledge of plants
- 2) Provide a safe place for play and exploration
- 3) Be accessible to visitors
- 4) Be accessible to children, in scale and signage
- 5) Engage all the senses
- 6) Provide gathering spaces for large and small groups
- 7) Include a climbing structure and a sound sculpture

"We trust that the theme of this garden will be Petoskey's early heritage, especially the history and culture of the Odawa people at the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians, and we have received permission from the Odawa tribes to tell their story," Sandy commented.

We have a story to tell that is unique to our area. In Arlington Park, there is an historic boulder placed in 1913 to mark The Old Indian Trail from Mackinaw City to Grand Rapids used from time immemorial by the Huron, Ottawa, Chippewa, and other tribes. The name for our garden will be the Odawa word for garden, Kitigaan.

Our plan has been designed by Tim Knutsen of Beckett and Raeder, Inc., landscape design specialists. The garden will include three climbing sculptures, a bridge, a meeting place with shade, and a winding walk through Arlington Park. Not inexpensive, to redo an entire park. Our estimate is \$750,000. The city will write grants for much of that. Matching grants will be the best and will accelerate the process. The Petoskey - Harbor Springs Area Community Foundation already has a special fund in place for donations to our project, Kitigaan, the Children's Garden.

Sandy recently said this: "We all have the opportunity to share what we love. By sharing what we know and love about plants, pollinators, and conservation we will introduce and inspire our next generation to care for this earth. We are doing important work. Please join me in support of this unique gift to our city, Kitigaan, the Children's Garden."
